

ProOrganic project was initiated in November, 2013 to promote organic consumption in the State of Rajasthan. The objective of the project was to create demand among consumers for organic products and sensitise farmers for shifting towards organic farming and advocacy on issues related to organic farming. The project was concluded in March, 2017, with major activities getting accomplished in a span of three years like Awareness Generation Campaigns, Organic Fairs, Farmer's Training and Exposure Visits, Consultations apart from research components in the project area.

The project had a deep impact as a remarkable increase in the area of organic farming was observed in the State. In addition, there was also a hike in demand for organic products by the consumers. Looking at the success of Phase-I, the Swedish Society for Nature Conservation (SSNC) further agreed to extend its support for another four years to implement phase-II of the project entitled, 'Developing a Culture of Sustainable Consumption and Lifestyle through Organic Production and Consumption in the State of Rajasthan (ProOrganic-II)' from April 01, 2017 to March 31, 2021 at 192 gram panchayats (in 10 selected districts of Rajasthan). One of the basic ideas of the project is promoting sustainable consumption and production, which are important aspects of sustainable regime. This is largely consistent with the environmental and social factors and education and empowerment of consumers.

'ProOrganic-II' project mainly focuses on the aspect of sustainable food and farming, and to formulate an agenda to achieve the same. This will be acquired through promoting organic production of farm products on one hand, and promoting organic consumption, on the other. Consequently, this will also lead to sustainable development in Agriculture and Environmental sector, as a whole. The target group of the project comprises entire population of the selected 10 districts namely: Jaipur, Dausa, Chittorgarh, Pratapgarh, Bhilwara, Udaipur, Kota, Sawai Madhopur, Jhalawar, Jhodhpur; 96 blocks; and selected 192 *gram panchayats* of the districts covered of Rajasthan.

Village Level Awareness Campaign

To bring forward the whole movement down the line village level awareness campaigns have been an important activity, which were initiated in July 2017, and completed in January 2018. There were 192 village level awareness programme in all covering 192 *gram panchayats* in 10 districts. The purpose was to make consumers and farmers aware of organic products and to influence their buying/farming habits. Various modes to create awareness were organised. For example, street

plays; showing a movie on organic farming and local cultural programmes; fixing, displaying posters; and distributing hand-outs. Besides, other local and traditional activities like *Chaupal Baithaks* (village meetings) and puppet shows, etc. were also organised.

A Message to Urban Population

Green Action Week

With the rationale of influencing consumer behaviour in favour of organic food, various activities in the form of kitchen gardening, cottage meetings, street plays, signature campaign and Stakeholder Consultation took place in various parts of Jaipur.

CUTS collaborated with several Civil Society Organisations (CSOs), consumer groups, producer groups, policymakers and media to lead towards enhanced availability, affordability and consumption of organic food



products, while observing Green Action Week. This is an annual civil society campaign being organised in 29 countries with involvement of 53 CSOs. Moreover, the Green Action Week Campaign 2017— Safer, more Sustainable Food for All" aimed to facilitate awareness generation among the consumers of Jaipur—capital city of Rajasthan about organic food, specifically vegetables and fruits that would encourage consumers to shift towards sustainable pattern of consumption. The campaign was targeted at women and youth amongst the consumers. CUTS has succeeded in developing 100 kitchen gardens in Jaipur along with motivating several people, especially women and children who will lead the movement of change.

Message of Organic Farming Goes Wider

Green Action Week - India Campaign

The objective of this is to strengthen consumers by way of vibrant role of CSOs for raising awareness on environment and other areas of consumption, and promote and contribute to sustainable patterns of consumption amongst consumers, policymakers and other key stakeholders. Total 11 states namely Maharashtra, Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Chattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Kerala, Orrissa and Tripura were covered



under the campaign, and the activities were successfully conducted with the help of 12 State partners.

Follow up on Human Rights Based Approach

These workshops were organised keeping into three consideration the challenges faced by development professionals in the realm of gender equity and empowerment. Hence, in continuation, the workshop held on December 08, 2017 was a follow-up of earlier workshops held on Human Rights-based Approach. Since other organisations also had expressed interest in the workshop, it was decided to organise another workshop and invite other similar Civil Society Organisations (CSOs) and partner organisations to this workshop participating in the previous held National Workshop.

Total 81 participants comprising of 34 districts and block partners including their farmers; 29 other NGOs; five media persons and rest resource persons and team attended the event.

respectively attended the programme, and delivered sessions in the training. The event provided an exposure to the farmers of 'ProOrganic' districts. For the first time, a subject of organic farming has been clubbed with veterinary and animal science, which proved to be very useful to the participants. Total 102 participants from 10 districts of 'ProOrganic-II' project attended the workshop.

Annual Organic Lunch

George Cheriyan attended the 'Annual Organic Lunch' organised by M R Morarka-GDC Rural Research Foundation on December 17, 2017 in Jaipur under the auspices of 'Morarka Organic'.

Prakratik Khadyaan Mela

Prakritik Khadyaan Mela (Traditional Foodgrains Fair) was organised by Jamnalal Kaniram Bajaj Trust in Sikar on December 29, 2017. Total 50 stalls of organic products were displayed by farmers. Rajdeep Pareek visited the fair. They are introducing Zero Budget Natural farming by Shri Subhash Palekar in Sikar. More than 200 farmers have adopted this technique.

Forest Food Festival

Two Days' Farmers Training

Rajdeep Pareek and Dharmendra Chaturvedi attended A two-day Farmers' training on February 08-09, 2018 on Organic Farming in the capacity of Subject Trainer. The objective of training was to get acquaintance with the knowledge and technologies of organic farming with farmers. The programme was facilitated by Sree Ram Sansthan, in Ajmer, and was organised by Naval Singh and Bhanwar Singh – progressive farmers at Nawal Organic Farm, Jharana of Jaipur.

Exposure Visit to Kitchen Garden

George Cheriyan, Director, CUTS along with his team members visited Orean Greens, a famous kitchen garden – developed by Neeta Upadhyay on February 09, 2018 in Jaipur. They observed and learned various techniques of organic farming, bonsai, etc.

Project Team's Visit to Nawalgarh

Project Team's Visit to Nawalgarh Shekhawati Festival, which is organised annually in Navalgarh (Jhunjhunu). George Cheriyan along with the project team visited the festival and interacted with farmers, organic producers and consumers to witness organic culture being adopted in the region. The team also visited Kan Singh Ki Dhani', which is an alternate home for living on February 17, 2018.





Exposure Visit to Banswara and Dungarpur

There are multiple farmers, who are either practicing organic farming or have recently switched to organic production in Rajasthan. George Cheriyan, Rajdeep Pareek and Akanksha Chaudhary from CUTS CART along with Madan Lal Keer from CUTS centre for Human Development (CHD), Chittorgarh made exposure visits to many of these farmers in five districts (Bhilwara, Chittorgarh, Pratapgarh, Banswara and Dungarpur) of south-western Rajasthan on March 21-

23. 2018. In Bhilwara, Chittorgarh, Pratapgarh and Banswara the team visited different organic farmlands whereas in Dungarpur, they interacted with officials of the Department of Agriculture to know the status and progress of 'Organic Dungarpur' which is declared as first Organic District of Rajasthan.

Exposure Visit to Community Seed Banks in Uttarakhand

Community Seed Banks in Tehri Garhwal are considered an example for its preservation of seed genomes and efficient working. Rajdeep Pareek and Dharmendra Chaturvedi visited there on March 27-28, 2018 and met with Vijay Jardhari, who is a famous seed saver, environmentalist and the founder of 'Beej Bachao Andolan'.

Jardhari has collected different varieties of rajma, paddy and other minor millets as part of his research work. The team also



visited two community seed banks in Quanli and Khalpali villages operated by village women group and supported by Mount Valley Development Association. They are using traditional methods to store the seeds and providing the same to others for use. Besides, this women group is also running a self-sustained dairy.

Project Outputs

The project has been successful to bring all stakeholders on a common platform, to discuss issues related to organic consumption and farming. Related government officials, experts, organisations (consumers and farmers) working on issue are actively participating in the project events. In addition, more requests are being received to involve them in the project that has been successful in creating a positive environment in favour of organic farming and consumption. There is adequate support from government officials and they are invited as resource persons in all activities from time to time. The project activities were covered by local print and electronic media.

Baseline Survey

The purpose of the baseline survey was to collect evidences about ground realties of organic consumption and production. The baseline survey revealed that nearly 86 percent consumers in the state are well aware of organic consumption and 91 percent farmers are aware of the adverse effects of the chemical farming. The survey was conducted amongst 1795 consumers and 644 farmers of 192 gram panchayats of selected 10 districts of Rajasthan. Details can be accessed at:
