The new law aims to close a 7 percent wage gap between men and women in the island nation of more than 323,000 people, Viglundsson said.

Enjoy the ‘Covfefe’

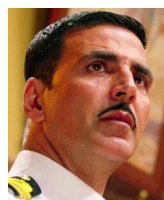

Highest Tax Collection

Jaipur Municipal Corporation (JMC) too has decided to set up open gymnasiums in its parks on lines of those set up by Jaipur Development Authority (JDA). A budget of ₹8 crore has been allocated to set up open gyms in parks of all 91 wards.

The corporation will soon invite tenders for this purpose. These machines will be set up in phased manner and JMC will seek

JMRC's Efforts Fail

The efforts of Jaipur Metro Rail Corporation (JMRC) to earn additional revenue by leasing out space for advertisements inside and outside the Metro trains and stations have entirely failed.

The JMRC would invite tenders once again. For buying space for advertisement inside trains, two companies had participated in the tender process. Out of which, one company failed to clear the technical bid.

The company which won the tender quoted 40 percent low rates. Another company that showed interest to use space on rent for advertisements on Metro pillars also quoted rates 50 percent less than expected. (Tol, 17.04.17)

Water Harvesting Plan

The Directorate of Local Bodies (DLB) has started restoration of stepwells and construction of rainwater harvesting systems under the *Mukhyamantri Jal Swavalamban Scheme* (MJSS) without any concrete planning.



The Department has already initiated rainwater conservation work in 66 ULBs. However, several anomalies came to fore after Sriram Vedire, Chairperson of Rajasthan River Basin and Water Resources Planning Authority, inspected three sites in the state capital.

“Besides, directions were given to submit the planning to use stored rainwater”, said an official.

“To take care of the man-animal conflict, we have allocated ₹7 crore Compensatory Afforestation Fund Management and Planning Authority (CAMPA) funds to construct 7 and 9 feet high wall. No BS-III Buses Purchase

Jaipur City Transport Services Limited (JCTSL) has decided to cancel purchase of hundred new BS-III buses. With this, fleet of new buses will now be replaced with existing ones in June 2017. JCTSL had ordered new buses as many existing rear-engine buses were in need of maintenance and their performance was poor.

The firm had to deliver new buses in March 2017. However, after the Supreme Court’s order, JCTSL cancelled the delivery and asked for buses with upgraded model. The company has sought three months’ time to deliver new buses.

SC Fines NWR

Rajasthan High Court imposes a fine of ₹1 lakh on North Western Railway (NWR), Jaipur for filing a frivolous litigation. The NWR had filed litigation with regard to regularisation of part-time porters, on which the Supreme Court has already given its direction. The cost is to be distributed equally among the petitioners.

The single bench of Justice Sanjeev Prakash Sharma imposed the cost on a petition by Madan Mohan Sharma and 38 others, who were working as part time porters with the North Western Railway in Jaipur.

Govt. Checks Irregularities

The state government has started tightening the noose around Bhagwan Mahaveer Cancer Hospital and Research Centre (BMCHRC) at JLN Marg, Jaipur. JDA officials along with a doctor from Health Department also reached the hospital to check the alleged irregularity of not providing free medication to 25 percent patients from below poverty line (BPL) category.

It is mandatory to fix an hour and provide free medical check-ups to poor patients at the outdoor patients department (OPD). Similarly, 10 percent beds should be reserved for the poor.

Judiciary Takes the Wheel for Road Safety

Supreme Court Panel's direction to all states – suspend driving licence for a minimum of three months for traffic violations including over speeding and red light jumping

Supreme Court (SC) Panel has directed all the Indian states to suspend driving licence for a minimum of three months for traffic violations including over speeding and red light jumping. In a major step towards curbing road accidents, a SC appointed Committee has asked all the states to suspend licence of traffic rule violators, even for over speeding and red light jumping, for a minimum period of three months.

The other violations listed by the panel headed by former SC Judge Justice K S Radhakrishnan include carrying overload in goods carriages and carrying persons in goods carriages, driving vehicles under the influence of drink and drugs, using cell phones while driving. The Committee further directs that in case of driving a vehicle under the influence of drinks or drugs, the police should prosecute the offender and seek imprisonment as prescribed under Section 185 of the Motor Vehicle Act, 1988 even for the first offence.

It also directed that the helmet laws be made applicable all over the State/Union Territory or UT both for main riders and the pillion riders. "In case where the law relating to the use of helmet is violated by either the main rider or the pillion rider, they should both be subject to Road Safety Education and Counselling for not less than 2 hours before imposition of fine as prescribed under the Act", it mentioned.

It indicated that those who violate the seat belt law should also be subject to Road Safety Education and Counselling before imposition of fine. The Committee also directed the States and UTs to submit action taken reports at the end of every year. The Committee has so far submitted four reports to the SC from October 2014 to March 2015. It has pointed out serious lapses in implementation of safety laws by States, which has led to increasing number of road fatalities.

Furthermore, the Committee constituted by the Supreme Court of India to monitor and measure implementation of

road safety laws in the country has had detailed discussions with the concerned Central Ministries and all the States/UTs on the trend of road accidents and fatalities.

The data furnished by them have clearly established that the number of fatalities in India continues to be very high, causing serious emotional trauma and economic loss to the families of the deceased and the society. The compensation awarded to the victims by the insurance companies also runs into hundreds of crores of rupees every year.

The Committee has in the recent past years issued directions to the States/UTs to establish institutional arrangements to promote road safety, undertake engineering measures to make roads safe, tighten enforcement together with promoting road safety education and establishing adequate trauma care facilities, and the Committee has been closely monitoring the action being taken by the States/UTs.

CUTS Contribution in Road Safety

CUTS International has been consistently advocating and initiating many projects on road safety. In its recent endeavour, CUTS in partnership with Consumer Education and Research Centre (CERC), Ahmedabad organised an Advocacy Meeting on Road Safety on May 26, 2017 under the project 'Campaign for Enhanced Road Safety in India' through advocacy for enactment of Motor Vehicles (Amendment) Bill, 2017' at Ahmedabad, Gujarat.

The main agenda of the meeting was to discuss the changes made in the Motor Vehicle (Amendment) Bill or MVA Bill, 2017 and to advocate for the early passage of the Bill as it has been passed in Lok Sabha and expected to be passed in Rajya Sabha in the upcoming monsoon season.
