I am angry because I got infected with COVID-19 in spite of having had my two vaccine jabs. This was discovered on 18th April. While I was asymptomatic, my wife, who too had taken two jabs, had to be hospitalised at the wonderful Santokha Durlabhji Hospital due to body ache and fever. She was there for about three nights and then sent home without the symptoms, while I stayed at home, but quarantined.

But what was more surprising was that both my 11-year-old grandkids too tested positive. This made me more angry. They, too, were asymptomatic for a long time but stayed at home in quarantine with us.

We should soon be fit as a fiddle. However, we are told that we will need to keep maintaining all preventive measures, such as wearing a double mask, maintaining social distance and washing our hands regularly.

If one reviews the national situation, there is much chaos. We are told that there is a new variant that is causing a second wave. There is a shortage of oxygen, beds, doctors, medicines etc. which is causing a huge number of deaths. This, too, has made me very angry. Many have said that this is a governance and institutional failure. Besides, elections were held in few states where the crowds collected without any precautions.

Similarly, the Kumbh Mela took place at Haridwar without any preventive measures. We do not have any figures as yet of the resultant infections, but surely they would be in thousands. In fact, the Madras High Court said that the Election Commission should be charged with murder for allowing the carelessness.

I am sure that all this could have been better managed by not allowing the events to have taken place and thus saved more lives. The courts too acted late in pulling up the government too late to protect people from dying. The deaths happened due to a lack of facilities.

Not so long ago, the country's supremo was speaking loudly about controlling the pandemic but ignored scientific advice given in September 2020 that new variants are in the pipeline. Consequently, we have reached record heights in the world in terms of infection and deaths.

Quite clearly, the health infrastructure is creaky, even in our national capital: Delhi. As a result, our control of the disease is not in order. Besides that, the virus is mutating in various new forms, which will beat all efforts to be made by us. The economy was in bad shape and will continue to slide downwards. Joblessness will continue to rise while our upcountry labour will return to their roots to eke out a living of sorts, knowing that their jobs in our industrial centres have gone out of the window. Social unrest will follow.

One cannot blame anyone for this but nature. The global community had adopted the Sustainable Development Goals in 2015, which were targeted at full achievement by 2030 when 'no one is left behind'. One of the 17 goals is on Sustainable Production and Consumption. This is best echoed in what Gandhi had said that there is enough on this Earth for everyone's needs, but not greed. The pandemic is a grim reminder for us to mend our ways or go to hell.

India's lone fossil of world's oldest animal

Hidden in plain sight, one of the rarest fossils in the world may have been discovered in the fascinating Bhimbetka rock shelters, a Unesco site about 40km from Bhopal.

Researchers believe they have found the first-ever fossil in India of a Dickinsonia —the Earth's 'oldest animal', dating back 570 million years — on the roof of what's called the 'Auditorium Cave' at Bhimbetka.

The find has been published in the February edition of Gondwana Research, an international journal. Dickinsonia fossils have shown they could exceed four feet in length, but the one found in Bhimbetka is 17 inches long.

Airbags mandatory for front seats

The Indian government has made the passenger side airbag mandatory in new cars. The Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH), in a gazette notification, announced the new rule that will require all new vehicles to have dual front airbags as standard fitment from April 01, 2021.

The Ministry has issued Gazette notification regarding the mandatory provision of an airbag for a passenger seated on the front seat next to the driver. This has been mandated as an essential safety feature and is also based on the Supreme Court Committee on Road Safety suggestions. (Mint, 06.03.21)

Power to transmit through the air

Emrod, a firm based in Auckland, has collaborated with Powerco, a New Zealand electricity distributor, to develop a prototype system for an enclosed test facility. The plan is to beam energy from a solar farm on the North Island to a client several km away.

The aim is to transmit the power as a narrow beam of microwaves. That will overcome the two fundamental flaws in Tesla's plan.

One was how to charge people for the electricity they can scoop from the air. The other was the need to overcome the law of radiative propagation.

Japanese tycoon facilitate free Moon ride

Japanese billionaire Yusaku Maezawa has invited eight people to join him for a free Moon voyage on SpaceX Starship rocket sometime in 2023.

Maezawa, the founder of Japan's largest online fashion retailer Zozotown, said that he wants people from all backgrounds to join. He has started a contest for the public where everyone who pre-registers will receive an email about the selection process.

Woman awarded for housework

A Chinese divorce court has ordered a man to pay his wife the equivalent of US\$7,700 as compensation for housework during their five-year marriage.



Under a new civil code, a person may seek compensation from their partner during a divorce if they were the primary carer for children or elderly parents or did most unpaid household work. The amount should be negotiated, but if that fails, then it will be decided by the court.

A Beijing court ruled the husband, surnamed Chen, must pay his now ex-wife, Wang, the sum of 50,000 yuan for not pulling his weight around the house.

A French nun who lived through two world wars and the Spanish flu has also survived a bout of the coronavirus.



Bhiwadi 5th polluted city in world

The city's air quality improved by approximately 14 percent between 2019 and 2020, according to the World Air Quality Report, 2020, released by the Swiss air technology company IQAir.



Jaipur is at 155 spots in the most polluted cities globally.

The air quality in Bhiwadi, Jodhpur, Pali, Jaipur, Kota, Alwar, Ajmer has also improved significantly during the same period, the report said.

According to the report, 22 out of the 20 most polluted cities are in India. In Rajasthan, an industrial town in Alwar, Bhiwadi has bagged the dubious distinction of being the fifth most polluted city globally. (Tol, 18.03.21)

Biological park gets new arrivals

A Rajasthan Forest Department team reached Nahargarh biological park. The new members are expected to boost the park, which lost a big cat in 2020. The animals will be kept in quarantine for three weeks and monitored before they are introduced to the public.

The forest team led by senior veterinarian Arvind Mathur had reached Odisha. In an exchange programme, the state forest department will send alligators, wolves, Chinkara and leopards to Odisha.

Hotels to set up microbreweries

For the lovers of freshly brewed beer in the city, here is a reason to celebrate.



To encourage light alcoholic beverages, the Excise Department has framed new rules to install microbreweries in the premises of hotels and clubs.

Excise commissioner Joga Ram has issued the notification of the Rajasthan Brewery (Amendments) Rules, 2021.

As provisioned in the new Excise Policy 2021-22, for the first time in history, the ED will grant licences for the working of the microbrewery.

Morning walk at Botanical park

The botanical park along the Dravyavati riverfront that remained closed despite work being completed two years ago has been opened for the public.

The area of the park is around 4,000 square-metre. It houses more than 1,000 different species and about 1 lakh plants and trees ranging from cactus, tropical plants, ayurvedic plants and herbs to exotic species which generally survive in the cold and high altitudes of the Himalayas. A greenhouse has also been created to house such exotic varieties as orchids and lilies.

The JDA will also soon rent out cafeterias and kiosks built in the bird and botanical parks that would help in earning more revenue. (Tol, 05.03.21)

Malls lack fire safety

During a sudden inspection of three malls in the city, the Fire Committee of Jaipur Municipal Corporation (JMC), Greater, found many discrepancies and a weak fire security system.

Paras Jain, Chairman of the Fire Committee, and other members inspected Crystal Court, Gaurav Tower and OK Plus at Mansarovar, where many loopholes were found in the fire safety systems.

According to rules, notices will be served to the administration of these malls and if a reasonable reply is not received, then action will be initiated against them. (Tol, 18.02.21)

Bus services on rural roads

The transport department is attempting to run buses on new routes in the rural areas of Rajasthan. For this, the state transport minister wrote to all the MLAs, out of which over 150 have replied.

They have given the lists of routes that have no public transport and the officials will compile this data to



segregate between the routes that have absolutely no buses and those with fewer passengers.

There are a few routes in rural areas on which no buses have been operational even post-independence and we want the connectivity to be improved. (Tol, 17.02.21)

Pocso court convicts rapists

A Pocso court in Jhunjhunu awarded capital punishment to 21-year-old Sunil Kumar for kidnapping and raping a five-year-old girl, a mere 26 days after the crime. The accused has also been given 10 years imprisonment and asked to pay three penalties of ₹25,000 each.

According to police, the girl was playing along with her siblings in a



village near Pilani town of Jhunjhunu district when the accused approached them and asked for a screwdriver to repair his scooter.

As soon as the elder 15-year-old boy went inside the house to fetch it, the accused kidnapped the five-year-old and took her 40km away and raped her. (Tol, 18.03.21)

Shift dairies from city limits

Chief Secretary Niranjan Kumar Arya has directed local authorities to shift out dairies operating in the city limits at the earliest.

He said accidents are often happening due to stray animals roaming around the city roads, causing fatalities to humans and animals. The Supreme Court and High Court had ordered several times that dairies operating in the city needed to be shifted. He said action should be taken urgently on this matter.

Arya said the beautification of Jaipur was a priority of the state government. He also directed to speed up the work related to cleanliness. (Tol, 18.02.21)

Over 82% FASTag coverage in Raj

With nearly 6.25 lakh registered vehicles in the state, the FASTag coverage has crossed 82 percent. The vehicles without FASTag or functional FASTag will have to pay double the fare.



Meanwhile, state transport departments send text messages to vehicle owners, pointing to the violation and mentioning that they could be imposed a penalty if they are caught.

It has been further mandated that a valid FASTag is mandatory while getting new third party insurance through an amendment in Form 51 (certificate of Insurance), wherein the details of FASTag ID shall be captured. (Tol, 16.02.21)

Registration for e-rickshaws restarts

The transport department has restarted the registration process of e-rickshaws which had been stopped for over a year because these were causing traffic congestion.



There are approximately 14,000 e-rickshaws in Jaipur, and a committee of various stakeholders will be constituted for the functioning of the vehicles. A policy will also be drafted for their registration and giving licences.

The e-rickshaw dealers have been directed to submit an affidavit with a declaration to conduct a 10-day drivers' training programme for the e-rickshaw drivers. (Tol, 16.02.21)

Major intersections to be signal-free

Seven major intersections, including Rambagh Circle, B-2 Bypass, Birla Mandir will be signal-free. This ₹800 crore project will be completed by 2022.

First of all, work will be done on those crossroads where there is less land requirement or no need to acquire more land. Work on Jawahar Circle, B-2 Bypass and Laxmi Temple Tirahe will start first.

Rambagh and B-two will be provided with model leaf-under passes and models of modern design. The underpass will be built at Chaimu House Circle, Birla Mandir, OTS Chairahe and Laxmimandira Tirahe. (DB, 16.02.21)

Metro Neo project on BRTS corridor

When the state government plans to raze allegedly under-utilised and accident-prone Bus Rapid Transit System (BRTS) corridor, the Jaipur Metro Rail Corporation (JMRC) has coined an idea to run low-cost Metro Neo service in the corridor.



This new Mass Rapid Transit System can provide a safe, eco-friendly, comfortable and reliable transportation alternative to the city without disturbing the existing infrastructure.

After a recent traffic survey in the city, there is a finding that Metro Neo service could easily replace buses in the 7.3-metre wide existing corridor. (Tol, 28.02.21)

Traders to install CCTVs without delay

Jaipur police have re-issued its order to ask financial and commercial establishments to install CCTV cameras to ensure better security and safety.

These establishments include shops, private lockers, petrol pumps, guest houses, restaurants and multi-storied housing societies. The police are going tough this year till now at least 10 FIRs have been lodged against those violating the order of installing CCTV.

Rahul Prakash, Additional Commissioner of Police, Law and Order, had earlier issued Section 144 of CrPC in which shops, private lockers, liquor shops, guest houses, restaurants were directed to install CCTV cameras. (Tol, 16.02.21)

Delay in providing flats to poor

The Jaipur Development Authority (JDA) has miserably failed in providing houses to economic weaker section (EWS) and lower-income group (LIG) under Chief Minister Jan Awas Yojana.

In the past five years, the civic body provided possession to only 991 affordable houses against approved 44,900 houses in more than 65 schemes. As per JDA records, more than 15,000 flats of the EWS/LIG category are under construction and will be allotted soon.

The work in 69 multi-storied housing schemes is in progress. Similarly, plots will be allotted in 15 housing colonies.

Jaipur airport slips in quality ranking

In the Airport Council International ranking, the Jaipur airport has ranked 14 out of 22 airports based on 33 parameters. In 2020, the airport was on the 13th position.



ACI World has revealed this year's Airport Service Quality awards, highlighting the world's best airports as judged by their customers.

In this survey, 22 airports from India were ranked. Varanasi was at the top, followed by Chandigarh and Amritsar in the category of the airports with an annual passenger footfall between 20 to 50 lakh. (Tol, 14.03.21)

Scaffolding support for crumbling verandas

The promises of renovating verandas of the walled city have fallen flat as the authorities are now resorting to erect scaffolding at many places where cracks have appeared on the roof.

The verandas were supposed to be renovated under the Smart City project, but the slow pace of work is a major hindrance.

In Johri bazaar, Tripolia and Chandpole market, scaffoldings have been put up at many places to support the broken structures. In Johri bazaar, there are places where the scaffolding is supporting the roof for the last five years now. (Tol, 13.03.21)

JMC-Heritage tops swachh feedback survey

The JMC-Heritage has left behind JMC-Greater in terms of getting feedback from citizens for Swachhta Survekshan 2021.

JMC-Heritage has received 60,000 feedback, while JMC-Greater got 10,000. The Survekshan ended on March 31, 2021. The higher number of feedback for JMC-Heritage is that they had already outsourced their feedback collection to a private firm.

In 2020, the municipal corporation (undivided) was able to get 40,000 feedback, but this year due to pandemic, corporations cannot gather people for awareness. (Tol, 13.03.21)

Innovative mask distribution campaign

The JDA's state-of-the-art initiative to distribute masks during ongoing pandemic has yielded desirable results



as four lakh residents have availed the free of cost facility.

The civic body rolled an innovative idea and started mask distribution after constructing the wall. The model turned out to successfully fight the pandemic and wall constructed for mask distribution continued to stand firm till the state government initiated a vaccination programme.

Taking a cue from 'Neki ki Deewar' idea (to assist those in want), the JDA

The development and management of urban centres is one of the major challenges of our time and one of the most complex tasks of our societies.

GOOD GOVERNANCE**



In an increasingly urbanising world, sustainable urban development will depend largely on the management capacity of cities and the active participation of their citizens. It is now widely accepted that urbanisation is not only inevitable but also a positive phenomenon.

Cities are growing and they offer opportunities and the promise of a better life. In cities, it is possible to integrate human, economic and technological resources efficiently. Well-managed cities are a pre-condition for successful urban development.

However, sustainable urban development depends largely on improved management of cities. Policies and programmes for developing cities require strong, open and accountable local government institutions working in partnership with all interested parties.

Here lies the importance of urban governance. Good governance is epitomised by predictable, open and enlightened policy-making, a professional bureaucracy acting for the public good, the rule of law, transparent processes, and strong civil society participation in public affairs. On the other hand, poor governance is characterised by arbitrary policymaking, unaccountable bureaucracies, unjust legal systems, the abuse of executive power, a civil society unengaged in public life, and widespread corruption.

Good urban governance involves participatory decision-making. It involves federal, state and local governments and civil society, such as the private sector, community-based institutions, the media, etc.

The progress of a country depends in no small measure on the quality of its governance. While a democratic government may lay the foundation for good governance, a vigilant and active citizenry is essential to its sustenance.

In Malaysia today, about 60 percent of the population resides in urban areas, indicating the country is facing rapid urbanisation resulting from rural to urban migration.

Our cities and towns are going to be the frontiers for building a new Malaysia. This is where our local authorities have to play a pivotal and crucial role in dealing with the many challenges and problems of the urbanised environment.

With the rapid growth in industrialisation, the landscape has changed and local authorities are on the front lines facing the challenges of urbanisation. Local government, therefore, must have the capacity and the wherewithal to cope with the many issues and find quick and effective answers to community needs and services, including matters concerning crime. Local government, instead of being the lowest level of government, should become the highest in terms of community needs and services.

There are about 150 local governments in the country yet we do not have a strong central training institute to cater for their manpower requirements to meet the diverse functions of urban management. The only exception is the training institute set up for Kuala Lumpur City Hall.

The rapid urbanisation taking place now necessitates the development of a training and urban governance institute which can eventually function as a centre of excellence to undertake research and provide consultancy on all urban issues as well as train local government officials to better manage our cities and towns.

Cities and towns must have a clear vision and adopt a holistic approach in managing their future. They must be shaped and developed with five key elements in mind, namely, they must be developed to be socially just, ecologically sustainable, politically participatory, economically productive and culturally vibrant.
