When I last wrote in this column, it was about the uncertainty of the 2019 Lok Sabha elections, and many including me had to eat crow because the people proved us wrong. They voted overwhelmingly for Narendra Modi and he came back into his second term in an unprecedented manner. As he said most remarkably, there are only two castes in India: the poor and the other who are working to eradicate poverty. We are the other caste and assure NaMo of working hard to better the ecosystem to raise living standards of all people.



I have long argued that growth can also come through conservation and not necessarily through production. For example, road accidents in India cost the gross domestic product three percent or US\$8bn annually, resulting from 1.5 lakh deaths and 3.0 lakh injuries. We are the worst country in the world in terms of road safety. This is another area of our work since inception in 1983. I have also served as a Member of a Ministerial Committee to draft a National Road Safety Policy in late 1980s which was refined later. This led to an overhauled Motor Vehicles Act which will enhance road safety hugely and will be enacted this year.

At CUTS, we work on policy issues based upon solid evidence and field work. In terms of road safety in cities, we implemented a project in Jaipur with the support of Lund University in Sweden which identified 14 critical accident spots. I must have met at least six Jaipur Development Commissioners to implement the findings but the engineering staff did not move their butts. This is in spite of written orders of the then and also current Urban Development and Housing Minister Shanti Lal Dhariwal. It was also planned that this project could become a pilot for being copied in other cities. If only that had happened, hundreds of lives would have been saved, and an informed policy would be adopted by the government.

In recent times, two serious accidents under the nose of the Jaipur Development Authority in July have rekindled the debate and we hope that the powers will heed our advice and do the needful.

Another crime which had shaken the city recently was the rape of infants in Shastri Nagar. This led people to march on streets in protest...and the area and internet was shut down to quell the protests. Fortuitously, the accused, Sikandar was held and he turned out to be a serial offender. He was on parole from a life sentence. Hope he receives exemplary punishment, which is death penalty.

My heart cries on infantile rape, not that any type of sexual assault on others is pardonable. But the invasion of a child whose understanding is so limited and who, if she survives, will live with a nightmare and stigma for her whole life.

Newspapers report that child rapes are a rising tide. Every two hours 11 kids are victimised. Annually, around 35,000 cases of child sex abuse are brought to light, with nearly 1.35 lakh cases of child rape being registered in the four-year period of 2014-17. Till 2016, only 10 percent of trials were completed with a conviction in only 30 percent of cases. We definitely need better enforcement and conviction otherwise the perpetrators will get away and like Sikandar, commit the crime again, and again.

Green-powered Town

Hungary is planning to create a green-powered town with jobs and housing for thousands on a barren strip of Danube flood plain.

They argue the authorities did not take effective measures against atmospheric pollution, in particular during the very high pollution that Paris endured in December 2016.

The authors believe that it is important Facebook gives historians, archivists, archaeologists, and ethicists access to this data so that future generations "can use our digital heritage to understand their history."

expects will be 'fully-operational in various cities around the world by 2025.'

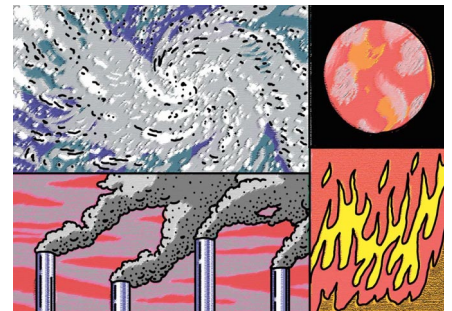
The battery-powered jet is capable of traveling 300 kms in 60 minutes on a single charge, and will connect cities through a network of landing pads.

Actress urges sex strike

1st Indian to cross Atlantic

Mumbai Pilot Aarohe Pandit became the world's first woman to cross the Atlantic Ocean in a Light Sports Aircraft on May 14, 2019. The 23-year-old, who was participating in the Women Empower Expedition, was flying solo when she landed her aircraft at Iqaluit Airport in Canada.

The pilot had to fly for 3,000 km with brief stopovers in Greenland and Iceland to achieve this feat. The expedition is being organised by Social Access, a not-for-profit communications firm.

Same-sex marriage legalised

Taiwan has legalised same-sex marriage, the first of any Asian state, with the passage of legislation giving gay couples the right to marry.

Lawmakers comfortably passed part of a bill that would allow gay couples to enter into 'exclusive permanent unions' and apply for marriage registration with government agencies.

Taiwan's President, Tsai Ing-wen, said: "We took a big step towards true equality, and made Taiwan a better country."

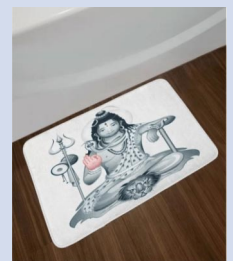
E-tailer Wayfair under scanner

Eco-friendly buses to hit roads

Public transport in Jaipur could do with a bit of an overhaul. Buses do not ply on a few major routes and most of all, these buses are old, dilapidated, and it would be wise to replace most of them.



The Jaipur City Transport Services LTD (JCTSL) plans to purchase a total of 600 buses to be added to the existing fleet, 300 of which will be state of the art, electric buses.

Govt. set to ban e-cigarettes

The Rajasthan government has decided to ban production, distribution, advertisement and sale of e-cigarette in the State.

Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot said that the decision, which comes a day before the World No Tobacco Day, will be an important step to curb addiction among youths.

Health Minister Raghu Sharma said the youths are being misled by advertisements of e-cigarettes as a better alternative. (BS, 30.05.19)



Patients to get medicines on bed

Sawai Man Singh Hospital of Jaipur, competing with private and corporate hospitals, has started providing medicines to patients on their beds.

Attendants of the patients will not have to arrange medicines, which now be provided by the nurses and other healthcare staff posted at the day care ward.

The facility has been initiated to benefit all patients but it will help those patients immensely who come for treatment without any attendant. Most of the patients are underprivileged and those also who are disowned by their families. (Tol, 11.06.19)

Disbursement of loans online

In a bid to go paperless, the state's co-operative sector would disburse short-term loans to farmers through online registration (online portal). In the first phase, loans would be disbursed to 25 lakh farmers, who pay up their loans regularly, through biometric verification.

The forms will be available at *Gram Seva Sahkari Samiti*. Farmers can get themselves registered on cooperative crop loan portal at any *samiti* or e-Mitra centre after filling the required information. (Tol, 01.06.19)

Night flights to be operational

The flights have started operating at Jaipur airport at night. The taxi track will save landing and take-off



time. When a flight is landing, another flight will be able to use the taxi track to reach the runway. It will save at least 3-4 minutes in landings and take-offs, the officials added.

The flight operation will not be allowed for two hours from 2.30 pm to 4.30 pm (except on Sundays), but it would not have any affect because no flights are currently operating during this period. This schedule is in effect from June 01, 2019 and will continue till October 26, 2019.

Jaipur to get additional water



Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot has, in principle, approved the Bisalpur Jaipur stage 2 project which will enable the city to receive 170 MLD additional water.

The Bisalpur-Jaipur stage 2 project will cost ₹288 crore. It will be able to provide water to close to 8 lakh people living in Prithviraj Nagar, Kho Nagoriyan and Jamdoli.

Additional ₹564 crore has been allocated for developing a network of pipelines in Prithviraj Nagar benefiting close to 3.5 lakh people. (Tol, 12.05.19)

Providing guidance to students

To help students for better understanding of their career options after school, Rajasthan Education Department has decided to open a counselling centre 'Student Advisory and Guidance Bureau' at Shiksha Sankul, Jaipur.

The purpose is to provide better guidance to students about courses available in various educational institutions in the country as well as in foreign universities.

NWR to miss deadline

The North Western Railways (NWR) is once again going to miss the deadline for completion of electrification projects on Jaipur-Delhi and Jaipur-Sawai Madhopur rail routes.

Earlier, the authorities had claimed that Jaipur-Delhi electrification would be completed by June 2019 while Jaipur-Sawai Madhopur section would be completed by March 2019. Now, the authorities hope to finish the project by September 2019. (Tol, 12.06.19)

Funds to 30 startups

The Rajasthan government has disbursed funding to over 30 startups ranging from ₹1.20 lakh to ₹20 lakh as a part of the i-Start Rajasthan programme.



Through this initiative, various financial incentives are being provided to startup companies including subsistence allowance, initial financial cost, marketing assistance and techno funds so that they can establish a new position by creating their innovation and entrepreneurship in professional competition.

The state already has the largest government-run incubation network in the country. (Tol, 12.05.19)



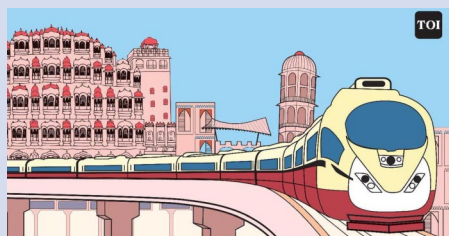
Metro Updates

Phase 1B of Jaipur Metro

Shanti Lal Dhariwal, Urban Development and Housing (UDH) Minister along with UDH officials thoroughly explored the site of Jaipur Metro and declared that entire work of phase 1B will be completed by October 2019.

Experts opine that metro line will start in 2020. After completing the metro line, a team of experts from Mumbai will be called for inspection, which will take around six months to get the green signal.

Metro fare rises by ₹1

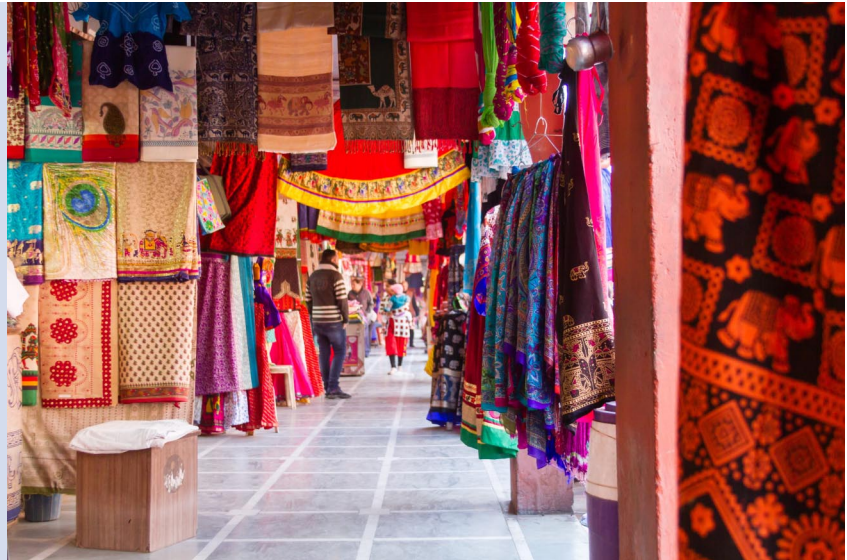
Jaipur Metro Rail Corporation (JMRC) has increased the fare by one rupee starting from June 01, 2019 to March 31, 2021.

The fare has been increased by one rupee of the higher slab, i.e. ₹11 and ₹17 that are increased to ₹12 and ₹18. However, lower slab of fare (₹6) will remain the same.

At present, Metro trains make 170 trips between Mansarovar to Chandpol every day. Trains arrive within an interval of 15 minutes from morning 6.25 am to 8 am and after 8 am trains arrive within 10 minutes. To increase the cashless transaction, there is a relief to the people who are using metro card as they will have to pay 10 percent less fare. (Tol, 30.05.19)

New MSMEs in Rajasthan now require no approvals, no inspections for first 3 years

The Rajasthan government also launched the Raj Udyog Mitra portal to help MSMEs set up new industries in the State easily.



In a bid to encourage entrepreneurship in the State, the Rajasthan government has said youth setting up new micro, small and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) will not require any approvals for the first three years. Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot also launched the Raj Udyog Mitra portal to help MSMEs set up new industries in the state easily.

Further, these entrepreneurs will be exempted from inspections by government departments during this period.

“Our decision will encourage youths to start their units and they will be able to set up their business with a free mind. They can get approvals anytime in three years. We want to give a suitable environment for business in the state,” said Ashok Gehlot.

In March 2019, the state government had notified MSME facilitation of establishments and operation ordinance, but its execution was delayed due to the model code of conduct for the Lok Sabha elections.

A bill to replace the ordinance will be introduced in the upcoming assembly session, Gehlot said. For availing this benefit, the entrepreneurs will have to register on the web portal <https://rajudyogmitra.rajasthan.gov.in>. It will issue an acknowledgement certificate upon registration.

“Rajasthan is the first state in the country to take such a revolutionary step for facilitating entrepreneurs. Youths will be encouraged and they will need no approvals and inspections by government departments for three years,” Gehlot said after launching the portal at his office.

Gehlot added that the country is going through a phase of economic slowdown and there is a need to address the challenge of unemployment and growth. He also said that the state government will introduce a new industry policy very soon.

In 2018, the state’s industries department proposed a series of measures to ensure development of new clusters proposed under a Centre-aided scheme. According to department officials, there are nearly 10 such probable sites for cluster development in Rajasthan.
