Urgent Need to Establish Road Safety Authority


Road safety experts of Rajasthan demanded the formation of a Road Safety Authority in Rajasthan for effective coordination between various departments and enforcement of road safety act, rules, plans and programmes. Pratap Singh Khachariyawas, Transport Minister, Government of Rajasthan while delivering the inaugural address as a chief guest, endorsed the demand. He said that the State Government would do whatever is required to ensure road safety in Rajasthan, including the formation of Road Safety Authority, Child Road Safety Policy and Trauma Care Policy.

The Minister inaugurated the State level Consultation organised by CUTS at Jaipur in collaboration with the Transport Department, Government of Rajasthan, on September 07, 2021. George Cheriyan, Director, CUTS, delivered the opening address. In the inaugural session, other speakers were Sushmit Biswas, Additional Director General of Police (Traffic) and Mahendra Soni, Transport Commissioner.



Rajasthan witnesses loss due to road mishaps

Rajasthan has witnessed a socio-economic loss of Rs 49,230.86 crore due to road accidents since 2016, according to an analysis. This means, every year on average there is a loss of Rs 9,846 crore in the state due to accidents. However, owing to fewer deaths and injuries because of the pandemic, the figure decreased to approximately Rs 8,000 crore in 2020.







India tops world in road deaths

Nearly half a million traffic accidents over the span of a year in India resulted in around 150,000 total deaths, and experts believe that these road traffic fatalities could be lowered with proper planning and implementation of rules. India has only one percent of the world's vehicles but accounts for 11 percent of global deaths from road accidents, according to a report by the World Bank released earlier this year.

Witnessing Chemical-Free Farming in Rajasthan

"S till, there is a long way to achieve the desired outcome of achieving chemical-free farming in Rajasthan," said George Cheriyan, Director, CUTS International in a Stakeholder's Consultation marking the conclusion of bridge year activities under its ongoing project 'ProOrganic', which aims to promote organic farming consumption and production in the state.



He said that during an intervention, which has completed now eight years has been able to produce results in converting around 280 farmers from chemical to organic and the overall increase of around four percent from the last baseline survey done in 2017. People are now becoming more worried about their health and 97 percent of them would eat organic food if it is easily available in the market.

S K Jain, Director, Rajasthan State Seed & Organic Certification Agency, Jaipur, stated that the government will keep all farmers' difficulties in mind and make every effort to support them.

A S Baloda, Director of the Rajasthan Agriculture Research Institute, emphasised the need to continue to promote organic farming, noting that farmers and consumers should recognise its importance in the long term.

Om Prakash, ex-Director of Jaipur Doordarshan, spoke about the need for farmers and the government to collaborate and strive to find a new path where organic farmers may obtain a fair price for their organic products.

Need Extensive Awareness on Good Samaritan in Rajasthan

A round 58 percent of deaths occur due to traffic accident injuries. Suppose the injured sufferer is sent to the hospital right away. In that case, he may preserve his life," said Biju George, ADGP (Vigilance), Government of Rajasthan. He was Chief Guest in a workshop on 'Issues Focusing on Good Samaritan Guidelines: Challenges and Way forward' organised by CUTS with the support of the Ministry of Road Transport and Highways, Government of India.

Cheriyan delivered the opening address. He said 80 percent of road accident victims in India do not receive emergency medical care withinthe critical first hour after an accident. There is a need to change the behaviour of police, the response of hospitals and generate public awareness on Good Samaritan Law.



Mahendra Soni, IAS, Transport Commissioner, Government of Rajasthan as special guest, highlighted that people should be aware of the term 'Good Samaritan' and that simply rewarding them is insufficient. They should support the government's efforts in reducing road fatalities. He shed light on the government's 'Jeevan Rakshak Yojana' plan.

In continuation, Dr. Narottam Sharma, Chief Medical Health Officer, Jaipur, spoke about the Golden Hour and

underlined the importance of making everyone aware of CPR. Nidhi Singh, Joint Transport Commissioner,

Road Safety; Dr Girdhar Goyal,Trauma Care Expert, SMS Hospital Trauma Care Centre; and Dr L N Pandey, State Nodal Officer, Transport Department, Government of Rajasthan, spoke about insights of Good Samaritan in the technical session.

Saxena presented Good Samaritan Law while Madhu Sudan Sharma, Senior Programme Officer, CUTS, moderated the technical session. More than 60 road safety specialists and delegates attended the workshop.

Rajasthan is Lagging Behind in the Implementations of SDG-12 Targets

CUTS, in partnership with the Swedish Society for Nature Conservation (SSNC), conducted a study on 'Sustainable Consumption and Production (SCP) from a Consumer Perspective' in India, with a particular focus in five states, namely Chhattisgarh, Himachal Pradesh, Kerala, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh. The study aimed to frame an understanding of SCP beyond SDG-12 targets and expand it from current sustainable consumption and consumer perspectives.

The fourth state-level consultation was organised in collaboration with NITI Aayog, Government of India, at Jaipur on October 27, 2021. Sundar Narayan Mishra, Senior Consultant-SDGs, NITI Aayog,



Government of India, delivered his keynote address on SDG 12. Anand Mohan, Member Secretary, Rajasthan State Pollution Control Board, Punita Singh, Joint Director, Department of Tourism, Rajasthan and Hitballabh Sharma, Deputy Secretary, Department of Rural Development, Rajasthan spoke as special guest. Seven departments shared their department-specific progress and programmes related to SDG12. More than 50 participants attended the meeting.

The fifth state-level consultation was organised in collaboration with the Kerala Institute of Local Administration (KILA), Government of Kerala at Thiruvananthapuram, on November 16, 2021. Joy Elamon, Director General, KILA; Josephine J., Chief, Decentralised Planning Division, Kerala State Planning Board (KSPB); S S Nagesh, Chief, Agriculture Division, KSPB; Sreekumar B., Director (i/c), PIEM Department spoke as a special guest on SDG 12. Eight departments shared their department-specific progress and programmes related to SDG12. More than 34 participants attended the meeting.

'Light for Defenders' Manifestation

CUTS and CSOs from 12 states observed Human Rights Day as 'Light for Defenders' manifestation to highlight the plight of environmental and land defenders at Jaipur on December 10, 2021. This is the fourth consecutive year, CUTS has observed this campaign along with global network.

The campaign aims to raise awareness on environmental defender's role in protecting land and environment, said George Cheriyan, Director, CUTS International. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), which was adopted on December 10, 1948, had a significant impact on our Indian constitution. UDHR is an international treaty enshrining the rights and freedoms of all people adopted by the United Nations General Assembly.

The Indian Constitution's framers were motivated by the notion of human rights and most of the UDHR's human rights were guaranteed. Article 12 to 35 contained in Part III of the Constitution deal with Fundamental Rights.

These are: Right to equality, including equality before law, prohibition of discrimination on grounds of religion, race, caste, sex or place of birth and equality of opportunity in matters of employment, he added.



Finding Solutions to Urban Governance Challenges

CUTS formed a 'Rajasthan City Mayors' Learning Platform (RCMLP)' in 2015 with a specific objective to improve the urban governance in the state through enhanced sharing of experiences and learning from each other. Since then, a series of Mayors' Conferences have been successfully organised in

different cities of Rajasthan, where City Mayors and Deputy Mayors participate in discussing the challenges and opportunities of their respective cities.

With this background, CUTS organised a Mayors' Conference in collaboration with NITI Aayog, Government of India, with the support of The Asia Foundation at Jaipur on November 26, 2021. The conference was attended by Mayors, Deputy Mayors, Chairpersons of selected ULBs and working committees of ULBs.

Abhijeet Kumar, Mayor, Bharatpur Municipal Corporation highlighted

various good practices in urban governance from developed countries. He also appreciated the effort of CUTS to organise Mayors' conference.

Manju Mehra, Mayor, Kota Municipal Corporation (North) said City Mayors' Learning Platform should be replicate in each municipal corporation. It will bridge the gap among elected representatives and concerned officials on the issue of urban governance.

Sanjeev Kumar Pandey, Additional Director, Department of Local Self highlighted various government schemes and initiatives on urban governance. He shared various best practices in Rajasthan on urban governance.

Punit Karnawat, Deputy Mayor, Jaipur Municipal Corporation Greater discussed various key issues in ULBs. Without giving autonomy to elected representative, it is difficult to achieve any SDG goals or improving the basic services.

Neeraj Jain, Deputy Mayor, Ajmer Municipal Corporation said elected members need more training and capacity building on urban governance issues. Mayors' Learning Platform will help discuss and find the urban governance challenges' solutions

Debolina Kundu, Professor, National Institute of Urban Affairs, New Delhi presented urban governance challenges in Rajasthan. She suggested that ULBs need more autonomy to work effectively.

Milind Mhaske, Director, Praja Foundation, Mumbai presented how condition of cities can be improved by empowering ULBs. He discussed Urban Governance Index, 2021 and good practices on urban governance around India, however cities of Rajasthan have poor performance according to the study.

Amar Deep Singh, Senior Programme Officer CUTS presented the key findings of the study report: 'Urban Local Governance in Rajasthan-Challenges and Opportunities' in the Conference.

State Level Organic Fair

The 'State Level Organic Fair' was organised under the at Pareek College, Bani Park on December 19, 2021 uner the bridge year of ProOrganic project. Surendra Singh Awana, a progressive farmer formally inaugurated the fair.

More than 25 stalls were put up by farmers of 10 targeted districts under the project along with couple of local organic outlets. The stalls showcased various organic vegetables, starting from fruits to

grains and to other eatable items both in the packed and loose form.

The other highlight of the fair was a couple of more stalls of partners and community women leaders of GAW, Rajasthan, who showcased their 'Best Out of Waste' products.

There was a footfall of around 250 consumers, who not only looked curious in purchasing various organic products but also enjoyed some cultural activities by local artists, who were also part of the fair. Media too highlighted the success of the fair.

Waste Segregation and Management a Priority in Jaipur

"Waste segregation and its management is a severe concern in the city of Jaipur and now it is high time that it should be put on the top of the agenda," said Jaipur Heritage Mayor Munesh Gurjar. She addressed the participants as Chief Guest in the Stakeholder's Consultation organised by CUTS International, marking the culmination of the Green Action Week (GAW) campaign of 2021 in Rajasthan. She urged that every Jaipur resident should support the government in this waste segregation and management drive.

Zila Pramukh of Jaipur Rama Chopra spoke about the need for garbage management and reduced consumption of goods and services. Chopra said that 'Kitchen Gardening' during the pandemic has



been very effective, and this habit should be adopted and carried forward by others. This will prevent many of us from the pandemic situation when we are afraid to buy vegetables from the market. She called for awareness and more extensive spread of the GAW campaign among school children, focusing on waste management.

In his opening address, George Cheriyan, Director, CUTS International, said in 2021,

humanity has again used all biological resources that our planet regenerates during the entire year by July 29, 2021, termed Earth Overshoot Day. From Earth Overshoot Day, humanity operates on ecological deficit spending until the end of the year, and hence there has to be an added thrust on protecting the natural resources.

Deepak Saxena, Assistant Director CUTS International, in his welcome address, said that GAW is a global campaign for promoting sustainable consumption and being observed every year in October.

V K Singhal, Chief Environmental Engineer, Rajasthan State Pollution Control Board, and Soumna Datta, retired Professor of Botany, University of Rajasthan, spoke on the theme. Nimisha Sharma, Programme Officer, CUTS, delivered a presentation on the entire campaign.

Making Jaipur, a Honk Free City

CUTS International has been active throughout on environment protection related work and filed a petition in National Green Tribunal (NGT), Bhopal against various concerned departments of Rajasthan Government on controlling the



menace of honking in the city of Jaipur and banning use of 'pressure horns' by private and roadways buses.

Under the intervention, CUTS has been campaigning for the last few years on the control of unnecessary honking by vehicles and also advocated for this through various types of awareness activities and representations before the government.

In the existing petition, CUTS has also sought from NGT to direct the State Government to initiate an 'Environment Compensation' of Rs. 5,000 in addition to the existing penalties/fines as per above regulations to be imposed on polluters for every act of noise pollution, on the basis of 'Polluter Pays Principle', in terms with the directions given by the Delhi NGT in the 'Vardhaman Kaushik vs. Union of India'.

Accepting the petition of CUTS, the NGT has issued notices to the concerned departments of the state government, viz., Home, Transport, Environment and Rajasthan Pollution Control Board, along with the Chief Secretary, in which the officers of the said departments have been asked to submit their replies within six weeks.

World Day of Remembrance

CUTS commemorated the 'World Day of Remembrance' in memory of road safety victims and organised a street



play at Central Park, Jaipur, on November 21, 2021. The theme was the safe speed in the streets, presented through powerful messages through the nukkad natak. More than 50 people participated.

Governor Released CUTS Study on SDG 12

rif Mohammed Khan, Governor of Kerala, released a study entitled "Sustainable Consumption and Production – A Consumer Perspective" at Raj Bhavan, on December 30, 2021, by giving a copy to Cheriyan. The study prepared by CUTS International mainly looks at SDG 12 (Responsible Consumption and Production) from a consumer perspective based on The United Nations Guidelines for Consumer Protection (UNGCP). The



Governor appreciated CUTS efforts to undertake research on such a vital topic and hoped that it would prove helpful to stakeholders concerned.

CUTS organised a Launch-cum-Training of Trainers (ToT) programme to kick start a three-month campaign at Chittorgarh on July 06, 2021. Under the intervention, 12 village level awareness meeting with women
