

Regulations in Health Sector: New Committee for Pharma, FoPL Notification and NMC's New Regulations

01 September-30 September, 2022

Taking into account the desired close scrutiny of relationship between pharma cos and medical practitioners the centre has formed a highlevel committee to look at the necessity of a legally enforceable mechanism to control pharmaceutical marketing practices. Pharma companies may now be sued for unethical marketing tactics.

A disagreement has developed regarding the design of the front-of-pack label in the drafted notification issued by the Food Safety and Standards Authority of India, despite the fact that some health experts believe that putting a warning symbol on products that are rich in sugar, salt, and fat is more likely to discourage customers from consuming them.

Due to ambiguity in NMCs new regulations with respect to international medical education NEET has caused uncertainty among students. In order to convince students to study abroad, foreign universities are taking advantage of the current situation by circulating misleading information.
