Slack in Pharma Regulation, Medical Education, and Unplanned Bond Policy: Health Sector

Due to the Gambia tragedy, Indian pharmaceuticals may now be looked at with suspicion, which will hurt the domestic pharma industry. It is time for the authorities in our country to regulate quality in the pharmaceutical industry without increasing the prevalence of inspector raj.

The Front of Pack labelling recommendations have been endorsed by 24 organisations and institutions, including the Centre for Science and Environment (CSE), the Indian Academy of Pediatrics (IAP), the Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI) and Diabetes India.

A resident doctor in Rajasthan is seeing a demonstration against the government's bond service policy, which is being imposed forcibly without proper planning. The resident doctors in the PG batch of 2019–22 put in a lot of effort during COVID–19. They still haven't gotten their degrees, and there hasn't even been a posting for their services in compliance with the bond policy.
