Heading towards AI Supported Health Systems: India's Promising Glimses

India's Promising Glimses April 01-June 30, 2026

The **Occasional News Wrap #23 (April-June 2026)** provides a comprehensive overview of the key policy, regulatory, and technological developments shaping India's healthcare sector. The quarter reflects a growing national commitment to building a more resilient, inclusive, and patient-centric health system through digital innovation, stronger governance, and evidence-based policymaking.

A major focus during the period was the accelerated adoption of artificial intelligence (AI) in healthcare, supported by the launch of the **Strategy for AI in Healthcare in India (SAHI)** and the **Benchmarking Open Data Platform for Health AI (BODH)**. Landmark judicial interventions, particularly the Supreme Court's recognition of trauma care as an integral component of the Right to Life, reinforced the importance of equitable access to emergency healthcare. The news wrap also highlights strengthened regulatory actions on food and drug safety, initiatives to improve maternal and newborn health, expansion of digital health services, and growing emphasis on preventive healthcare.

At the same time, the compilation draws attention to persistent challenges, including inadequate public health financing, workforce shortages, healthcare inequities, the rising non-communicable diseases, mental health concerns, and climate-related health risks. Overall, the quarter underscores India's gradual transition towards a technology-enabled, accountable, and sustainable healthcare ecosystem that prioritises quality, accessibility, innovation, and long-term public health resilience.

1.	AI in Pharma: How India's Drug Giants Are Betting Big on Artificial Intelligence <i>The Economic Times</i> April 03, 2026	Is AI in pharma just hype or a full-blown revolution? In this episode, ET's Anirban Chowdhury sits down with three industry heavyweights Sujay Shetty, Partner & Leader - Health Industries, PwC India, Phanimitra B, Chief Digital and Information Officer, Dr. Reddy's and Ramesh Swaminathan, ED, Global CFO, Head of IT, Lupin to unpack how artificial intelligence is transforming drug discovery, clinical trials, manufacturing, and even org design. From AlphaFold collapsing years of R&D into weeks, to Lupin deploying Gen AI across 90+ data repositories, this conversation goes deep into what's actually working, who's winning, and why the companies without an AI roadmap risk being left behind.
2.	Right to trauma care of citizens integral part of right to life: Supreme Court <i>The Hindu</i> April 04, 2026	In a landmark ruling with far-reaching implications for motor vehicle users in India, a Bench of Justices J.K. Maheshwari and A.S. Chandurkar underscored the need for trauma care to be recognised as a matter of right in the Indian public law system. Observing that the right to trauma care of citizens is an integral part of right to life, the Supreme Court directed all States and Union territories to operationalise the emergency helpline number '112' within three months and establish a functional good samaritan grievance redressal system. The Bench also directed the States to furnish periodic compliance reports by holding monthly meetings and uploading the minutes on the respective government portals.
3.	Centre launched AI-strategy, data platform for healthcare ecosystem: Minister informs Rajya Sabha <i>Economic Times</i> April 07, 2026	In a written reply, Minister of State for Health Anupriya Patel said the initiatives were launched during the India AI summit. The Union Health Ministry has launched the Strategy for AI in Healthcare in India (SAHI) and the Benchmarking Open Data Platform for Health AI (BODH) to promote secure and evidence-based deployment of

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		artificial intelligence in the country's health care ecosystem. Patel said SAHI is a national guidance framework for safe, ethical, evidence-based and inclusive adoption of AI across India's healthcare while BODH, developed in partnership with IIT Kanpur, provides a structured mechanism for testing and validating AI solutions before deployment at scale.
4.	Optimising India's Healthcare System <i>Drishti News</i> April 08, 2026	This editorial is based on “Bridging Gaps, Building Resilience’ which was published in <i>The Hindu</i> on April 07, 2025. The article highlights the dual burden of disease and healthcare disparities in India, illustrating how inadequate public health funding and high out-of-pocket expenditure push millions of people into poverty. Despite initiatives, such as Ayushman Bharat, access remains inequitable. India's healthcare system faces a dual burden of persistent infectious diseases, compounded by challenges, such as rural-urban disparities in healthcare infrastructure and inadequate public health funding. Although initiatives, such as Ayushman Bharat and digital health platforms have improved healthcare delivery, equitable access remains a challenge. High out-of-pocket expenditure spending pushes an estimated 55 million Indians into poverty each year, underscoring the urgent need for greater investment in preventive care and universal health coverage.
5.	Public Health in India: Strained by flawed policy and weak training <i>Next IAS</i> April 11, 2026	Despite efforts to improve access to healthcare , India's public health system remains underfunded and poorly coordinated, leading to inefficiencies in disease prevention, healthcare delivery, and medical education. India's public health system is designed to provide universal access to healthcare, through preventive, promotive, and curative services. It operates through national health programmes, state-level initiatives, and local

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		healthcare delivery mechanisms. The system plays a vital role in addressing the country's dual burden of communicable and non-communicable diseases, as well as persistent health disparities. The Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI) is a leading public health institution that works in the areas of training, research, and policy development.
6.	Pay to heal <i>Digital Health Portal</i> <i>April 15, 2026</i>	The report of the Bhore Committee (chaired by Sir Joseph William Bhore) in 1946 laid the foundation for India's first tax-funded health system, with primary healthcare at its core. In 1978, India endorsed the WHO's Declaration of Alma-Ata, which affirmed a commitment to comprehensive primary healthcare as a state responsibility. In 1983, the country's first National Health Policy was formulated with the goal of achieving "Health for All by 2000 through comprehensive PHC Services". Yet, India's healthcare system has fallen short of this vision. Instead, the country has developed a highly privatised healthcare sector characterised by pronounced rural-urban disparities in access to healthcare, the distribution of health personnel, and the availability of treatment.
7.	Fixing structural deficits in India's health system <i>The Hindu</i> <i>April 17, 2026</i>	The Minister of State for Health, Anupriya Patel, informed Parliament that 43 new medical colleges have been established and 11,682 MBBS seats along with 8,967 postgraduate seats have been approved for the 2025-26 academic year. Will this address India's problem of non-availability of doctors in the public health system? Of the 8,967 new postgraduate doctors, how many will actually have the inclination to serve in aspirational districts or underserved areas? Of the 43 newly sanctioned medical colleges, only eight are under State governments, eight are in the Employees' State Insurance (ESI) sector, and 27 are in the private sector.

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		There is no clearly defined policy or stipulation to ensure that public health institutions benefit fully from these expansions by filling existing vacancies in specialist cadre posts.
8.	200 Litres of Chemical-Laced Sauce Served with Momos, Chowmein Destroyed in Uttar Pradesh Raid <i>NDTV Food</i> <i>April 20, 2026</i>	Officials suspect the sauce contained chemicals, acids and artificial colouring, making it unsafe for consumption. Popular street food items such as momos, chowmein and burgers are widely consumed across India. However, a recent food safety raid in Uttar Pradesh has raised serious concerns about the ingredients used to prepare accompaniments served with these favourites. The Food Safety Department conducted a raid at a house in Hapur district, near Meerut, and seized around 200 litres of a suspicious, red-coloured vegetable sauce. Officials suspect the sauce was made using chemicals, acids and artificial colouring.
9.	Sub Standard Health Products is a huge Issue across the states: Rajasthan Bans 7 Sub-Standard Medicines <i>NDTV Lifeline</i> <i>April 22, 2026</i>	Prioritising public health and patient safety, the Commissionerate of Food Safety and Drug Control, Rajasthan, has issued an alert regarding seven medicines and declared them “Not of Standard Quality” following laboratory testing conducted between April 01-15, 2026, prompting immediate regulatory action across the state. Acting on the findings, the Drug Controller has directed all Drug Control Officers across Rajasthan to immediately withdraw the identified batches from circulation and initiate strict action under the provisions of the Drugs and Cosmetics Act, 1940. Commissioner T Shubhamangala stated that the department conducts regular inspections, sampling, and quality surveillance to ensure that only safe, effective, and compliant medicines reach the public and healthcare institutions.
10.	India’s Health Sector Accelerates Digital Transformation Amid	India’s health industry is undergoing a rapid transformation in 2026, driven by increasing patient awareness, digital innovation, and a strong shift toward preventive healthcare. With the

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	Rising Demand and Preventive Care Push <i>Health Tech Report</i> <i>April 30, 2026</i>	continued expansion of telemedicine platforms and AI-powered diagnostics, companies, such as Apollo Hospitals and Tata 1mg are redefining patient access by offering faster consultations, remote monitoring, and personalised treatment plans. The government's ongoing initiatives under Ayushman Bharat are further strengthening healthcare accessibility, especially in rural areas, while investments in health-tech startups continue to surge. Experts highlight that rising cases of lifestyle-related conditions such as Diabetes and Hypertension have pushed both private and public sectors to focus more on early diagnosis and wellness programmes.
11.	India needs political will to handle its many health crises <i>The Indian Express</i> <i>May 05, 2026</i>	From TB and cancer to diabetes and air pollution, experts call for stronger public health systems, better staffing, and preventive measures to tackle growing health challenges. As 2026 begins, India's health sector faces formidable challenges. The main priorities include improving health infrastructure, addressing shortages of medical staff in rural and remote areas, and tackling the rising disease burden that strains the public health system.

Government unveils SUMAN Roadmap 2030: India's new plan to cut maternal and newborn deaths <i>News9.com</i> <i>May 09, 2026</i>	India has made remarkable progress in improving maternal and child healthcare over the past decade, but reducing preventable deaths among mothers and newborns remains one of the country's biggest public health priorities. While access to institutional deliveries, antenatal care and skilled birth attendants has improved significantly, many women, particularly those living in rural, tribal and underserved regions, continue to face challenges in receiving timely and quality healthcare during pregnancy and childbirth. Recognising these gaps, the Government of India has now unveiled a comprehensive national strategy

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		aimed at achieving the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) targets for maternal and newborn health by 2030. The roadmap focuses on strengthening healthcare services from pre-pregnancy to the postnatal period while ensuring that no mother or child is left behind.
13.	India Health Summit 2026: Digital Innovation and Accessibility <i>Times Network India Health</i> May 13, 2026	India's healthcare sector is being transformed through digital innovation, expanding healthcare access, and a growing focus on self-reliance. India issues travel advisory as WHO declares Ebola outbreak a public health emergency of international concern <i>Mind</i> May 24, 2026	India has issued a travel advisory for the DRC, Uganda and South Sudan after the WHO declared the Ebola outbreak a public health emergency of international concern. The death toll has risen to 204. The World Health Organisation formally declared the Ebola outbreak spreading across the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Uganda a Public Health Emergency of International Concern, triggering a cascade of international responses that now includes a travel advisory from the Government of India.

Mental health is India's next sustainability crisis <i>Hindustan Times</i> June 01, 2026	Sustainability in healthcare has traditionally revolved around visible indicators such as green hospitals, adoption of renewable energy, waste management, and reduced carbon footprint. In the Indian context, there is an even greater sustainability concern, the ability to sustain the psychological, economic, and emotional well-being of its citizens. This starts with mental well-being. With mental health concerns being one of the greatest unmet needs globally, there remains a lack of interest in addressing it within the scope of healthcare sustainability in India.
16.	One in 10 Indians faces cancer risk before 75: Here's what WHO data reveals <i>Indian Express News</i> June 08, 2026	New global estimates show India's cancer burden is growing rapidly, with breast, oral and cervical cancers leading the rise. The country could see nearly 2.8 million new cases by 2050. According to the latest GLOBOCAN estimates, nearly one in ten Indians is at risk of developing cancer before the age of 75, while about seven in every 100 face the risk of dying from the disease before reaching that age. India recorded 1.41 million new cancer cases and 916,827 deaths in 2022, while more than 3.25 million people were living with a cancer diagnosis made within the previous five years.
17.	What are the potential implications of missing public health metrics in NFHS-6? <i>The Indian Express</i> June 09, 2026	The news highlights that India continues to have the highest number of anaemic populations in the world. By definition, anaemia is a medical condition marked by the deficiency of red blood cells. But the National Family Health Survey (NFHS-6) has dropped indicators on anaemia, as well as sanitation and clean cooking fuel. A total of 43 important indicators that were part of the earlier NFHS datasets have been omitted in NFHS-6. So here recommendation is that all these important indicators shall be included in the NFHS-6.

What lessons can India learn from Europe's response to heat-related health emergencies and urban planning challenges? <i>India.com</i> <i>June 12, 2026</i>	India and the world are witnessing one of the hottest summers in several years, with temperatures rising to nearly 50 degrees Celsius in May alone this year. While the rest of the world, especially Europe, has several frameworks like the EURO-HEAT project to tackle the rising heat in the region, India lacks similar frameworks. India needs to learn from the The Comprehensive Eight-Element Framework (often referred to as the Eight Core Elements of Heat-Health Action Plans).

Experts Explain For ageing India, why climate change poses a public health threat <i>Indian Express</i> <i>June 22, 2026</i>	Elderly people are particularly vulnerable to climate risks such as heatwaves. As such extreme weather events become more frequent, India needs to create frameworks that can identify, reach and support vulnerable older people. India is at the beginning of a large demographic shift. As fertility rates fall, and the population ages, a new worry is now emerging — the effect of climate change on the elderly. This means that policies to adapt to extreme weather must now take into account the requirements of the ageing population.
